These courses encompass Indian Metaphysics, Epistemology, Ethics, Gandhian Philosophy, Indian Argumentative Traditions, Text Readings, and Vedic Studies. This comprehensive approach reflects the institution's commitment to imparting modern education while preserving and promoting India's profound intellectual and philosophical heritage.

Indian Metaphysics delves into fundamental concepts about reality, self, consciousness, and the ultimate reality (Brahman). Epistemology explores knowledge acquisition, validation, and justification through perception and inference. Ethics emphasizes moral principles, including duty (dharma) and action's

consequences (karma). Gandhian Philosophy draws from Mahatma Gandhi's principles of nonviolent resistance (Satyagraha) and truth.

Indian Argumentative Traditions delve into argumentation methods from classical Indian philosophical texts, and Text Readings involve the study of classical Indian texts. Vedic Studies explore ancient sacred scriptures, the Vedas.

This blend equips SMVDU students with a profound cultural and philosophical foundation, enabling them to navigate the complexities of the contemporary world while upholding India's rich intellectual and philosophical heritage.

21.Distance education/online education:

Shri Mata Vaishno Devi University (SMVDU) does not offer distance or online education degree programs as part of its regular curriculum. While the university has demonstrated flexibility during the COVID-19 pandemic by transitioning to online teaching methods and providing digital resources, its primary mode of education remains on campus. SMVDU is focused on providing its students with a traditional, in-person educational experience, emphasizing face-to-face interactions and campus-based learning. While online resources and remote education, were implemented to respond to exceptional circumstances, SMVDU's core educational approach centers around on-campus, in-person instruction. However, student are given option to choose subjects in courses from SWAYAM / NPTEL with felxibility upto 40% of credits of programs.

- 3. The Credit Based System is implemented in the university since 2004 as the IIT pattern of education had been adopted at the beginning itself. MOOC-based credit courses are offered to

- 4. The last major change was done in May 2018 wherein changes were proposed by AICTE in their model curriculum.
- 5. The university bears the name of the goddess Shri Mata Vaishno Devi and thus focuses on instilling the Indian Value System and philosophy in the students through the curriculum. It results directly in better placement of our students.

These courses are offered to all the students of the University in different semesters to ensure that they are exposed to these important subject areas in line with the national needs. Through, this course, students are sensitized to ecological and environmental issues connected with land, air, and water, with awareness on sustainable development.

Besides this NSS program and VIKALP also play a pivotal role in shaping the students to be socially sensitive and responsible in their lives. The university incorporates cross-cutting issues of society such as Moral Values, Human Values, Professional Ethics, Ethical Values, Gender Equality, and Environmental Awareness into our curriculum, making them an indispensable component of our

curriculum. The subject "Environmental Science," which is concerned with the ecosystem, its balance, and its long-term viability, is a essential component of the curriculum.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Advance Learners: Students having CGPA > 7.50 with no active backlogs, after completion of 2nd year of the B.Tech., shall be eligible for applying to B.Tech.(Honors). Once their request is approved, these students shall be required to earn atleast 12 additional credits from among the School Core/Electives being offered for the M.Tech. Program, over and above the requirement of minimum credits for award of the B.Tech. degree. Additional credits required for award of Honors Degree, may be obtained by passing MOOCs based NPTEL/SWAYAM course(s).

Slow learners: If a student fails to earn an SGPA > 5.0 in any semester, then he/she will be considered as not doing well academically and will be put on Academic Probation. Such student(s) will be put under a Special Advisor, who is expected to monitor the students in a personalized manner. The Special Advisor is expected to closely interact with the weak student and his/her parents. A student will continue to be on Academic Probation for a minimum of two semesters even if he/she meets the academic requirement. The student will be removed from academic probation only after meeting the academic requirements, for not being placed on academic probation, in two successive semesters.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problemsolving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Consideration has been given in the 4-level curricula development process, to include courses in the curricula which promote and focus upon the implementation of various student centric methods such as: Internship, for B.Tech., B.Arch. & MBA Programs while students of all other programs are encouraged to go for summer internships. Field Trips & Industry Visits are conducted regularly for students of various programs to enable them to get the feel of the real-life situations. Projects / Dissertation are mandatory in all programs. Various participative techniques including group projects, group assignments, case studies, interactive discussions and exploratory presentations. Problem analysis is a significant part of almost all courses in Engineering, Science & Management programs. Laboratory exposure to students of science and engineering programs is a very important part of experimental learning and the university has state of the art lab set up in most of the schools. Pedagogical techniques like Flipped Classes have also been introduced. This has been widely possible because use of LMS and availability of large amount of multimedia content on NPTEL/SWAYAM and other websites including YouTube and MOOCs platforms like EDX and Coursera. Recording of lectures has been introduced with availability of recording facility in the Lecture Theaters. New pedagogical techniques like Think-Pair-Share have also been used to ensure maximum participation of students in the class.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning processes during the year

The number of computing terminals in the University has gone up during the last few years with better computing capabilities.

University has adopted the use of Open-Source Software in lab-work and research work. Number of software packages like Qualnet,

NetSim, MATLAB, ANSYS, 3D Experience, Creo, AutoCAD, REVIT, SPSS,

TCAD, MultiSim, ISE 9i, UltiBoard, COMSOL are in place. SMVD University Network (UnivNet) connects all buildings across campus including WifFi service with 300 Wi-Fi Access points. The network and internet services of the SMVD UnivNet are backed by Layer 3 Core Switch from Cisco, HP & Huawei, 135 Nos. Layer 2 distribution Switches, CISCO Pix Firewalls for Security, Central Authentication Gateway and Network Management System. Uninterrupted Internet services have been provided in SMVDU campus from 1 Gbps Internet leased line link from BSNL under NMEICT.

Application servers for various Schools have been created to provide seamless access to network licensed packages like AutoCAD, Ansys, Prowess CMIE, NetSim etc. The backbone was changed over fully to OFC covering the complete campus including Hostels.

All the faculty as well as the students have full access to the internet and learning is never a problem here.

- 2.5.3 IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes (continuous internal assessment and end-semester assessment) have brought in considerable improvement in examination management system of the institution
 - 1. The University has been using an in-house developed software (Examsoft) for generation of results and computation of CGPA / SGPA of the students. The grade sheets, transcripts, and provisional / migration certificates are also generated through the software while the registration was earlier done using another proprietary software. This proprietary system has been replaced by e-SAMARTH package which acts as a single seamless entity for student registration, generation of admit cards and generation of grade sheets by the faculty members thus reducing any scope for anomalies and inaccuracies while cutting down drastically on the time required for preparation of grade sheets. The Examsoft package is integrated with this thus making it very convenient to compile the results in a much shorter time.
 - 2. The University has also registered for National Academic Depositary (NAD) and Academic Bank of Credits schemes and has designed software package, integrated with the Examsoft and e-SAMARTH for automating the process of compiling and uploading the academic awards of the students on the NAD portal.
 - 3. The University has adopted the mechanism for forwarding the academic documents of the studentsby electronic transmission mode to WES, IQAS, and foreign universities for verification purposes, whenever such requests are received from the concerned students.
 - 4. The University has introduced security feature based papers for printing of Semester Grade Sheets (Mark Sheets),

Transcripts, Provisional & Migration certificates that are issued to the students to prevent any tampering of the certificates.

University has a fully functional incubation center (SMVDU Technology Business Incubation Center) established in 2015. It has been jointly established with the Grant-in-aid from NSTEDB, DST, GOI and SMVDU.

TBIC has offered physical incubation to more than 15 startups and virtual incubation to 28 startups in the last 3 years. 22 startups have been funded under NIDHI Seed Support Program whereas 17 Prayasees have been supported under NIDHI Prayas funding scheme of DST, GOI. Startups are actively working and catering to

diversified sectors like Agriculture, IT, Biotec etc. These incubated companies have generated patents and created a job pool of about 100 people.

Incubator has disbursed more than Rs. 2.35 crores to various startups and invested more than Rs. 2 crores in sophisticated equipments.

The proposal of allowing faculty members of the University to seek consultancy jobs was approved in the 16th meeting of the Executive Council held on 30th November, 2011. In order to encourage faculty members to undertake consultancies, a marginal share of 25% of the total fee was earmarked as overhead charges payable to the University.

However, of late it has been observed that many Missions, SPVs, Corporations, Government Departments, Organizations, Institutions, Societies etc. are signing MoUs and offering Institutional Consultancies to the Universities and therefore a need has been felt to revise the above overhead charges.

Subsequently, vide Notification no. SMVDU/R&D/21/6056-60 dated 24th November, 2021, the University Share/Overhead charges in case of Institutional Consultancies is enhanced to 50% of the total

Consultancy Fee from the existing share of 25%, wherever, the party seeking consultancy services signs a MoU with the University as an Institution providing the said services. However, in case a faculty member gets a consultancy assignment on his/her own merit, the Overhead Charges / University Share shall remain unchanged at 25% of the total consultancy fee.

All the students and employees of the University are eligible for membership of the library. The Library Membership is also open for external users. The library is equipped with an Integrated Library Management software package - e-Granthalya 4.0 version with all the modules for the library housekeeping operations, status of books (issued/on-shelf) and can check the account overdue against the borrower. Using e-granthalya OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue), users can search the Library Online Catalogue by Author, Title, Subject, and Keywords. The policy provides a framework a use of IT infrastructure and also lays down Vision and Mission of the University in making all its task IT enabled, it also outlines a mechanism for establishing and maintaining the IT infrastructure at SMVD University main campus.

SMVDU has appropriate budgetary provision for expansion and updating its IT facilities including wifi. Recently old networking switches & wifi have been replaced with new ones having better capability & operations have been installed at various locations in SMVDU. The PO & bill copy is attached for reference.

Networking infrastructure:

The University has campus network and Wi-Fi facility with around 4000 nodes. BSNL lease line through NKN & Fiber optic cables connected with all the Departments, Hostels & Residential through Network Centre for faster and efficient connectivity. Old and outdated computers are upgraded periodically. They are either replaced or enhanced with respect to configuration. Additional computing facilities are added based on the need arising out of requirements of students, research scholars and faculty.

Resource Mobilization Policy and Procedure

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Advance Learners: Students having CGPA > 7.50 with no active backlogs, after completion of 2nd year of the B.Tech., shall be eligible for applying to B.Tech.(Honors). Once their request is approved, these students shall be required to earn atleast 12 additional credits from among the School Core/Electives being offered for the M.Tech. Program, over and above the requirement of minimum credits for award of the B.Tech. degree. Additional credits required for award of Honors Degree, may be obtained by passing MOOCs based NPTEL/SWAYAM course(s).

Slow learners: If a student fails to earn an SGPA > 5.0 in any semester, then he/she will be considered as not doing well academically and will be put on Academic Probation. Such student(s) will be put under a Special Advisor, who is expected to monitor the students in a personalized manner. The Special Advisor is expected to closely interact with the weak student and his/her parents. A student will continue to be on Academic Probation for a minimum of two semesters even if he/she meets the academic requirement. The student will be removed from academic probation only after meeting the academic requirements, for not being placed on academic probation, in two successive semesters.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Consideration has been given in the 4-level curricula development process, to include courses in the curricula which promote and focus upon the implementation of various student centric methods such as: Internship, for B.Tech., B.Arch. & MBA

Programs while students of all other programs are encouraged to go for summer internships. Field Trips & Industry Visits are conducted regularly for students of various programs to enable them to get the feel of the real-life situations. Projects / Dissertation are mandatory in all programs. Various participative techniques including group projects, group assignments, case studies, interactive discussions and exploratory presentations. Problem analysis is a significant part of almost all courses in Engineering, Science & Management programs. Laboratory exposure to students of science and engineering programs is a very important part of experimental learning and the university has state of the art lab set up in most of the schools. Pedagogical techniques like Flipped Classes have also been introduced. This has been widely possible because use of LMS and availability of large amount of multimedia content on NPTEL/SWAYAM and other websites including YouTube and MOOCs platforms like EDX and Coursera. Recording of lectures has been introduced with availability of recording facility in the Lecture Theaters. New pedagogical techniques like Think-Pair-Share have also been used to ensure maximum participation of students in the class.

The number of computing terminals in the University has gone up during the last few years with better computing capabilities. University has adopted the use of Open-Source Software in labwork and research work. Number of software packages like Qualnet, NetSim, MATLAB, ANSYS, 3D Experience, Creo, AutoCAD, REVIT, SPSS, TCAD, MultiSim, ISE 9i, UltiBoard, COMSOL are in place. SMVD University Network (UnivNet) connects all buildings across campus including WifFi service with 300 Wi-Fi Access points. The network and internet services of the SMVD UnivNet are backed by Layer 3 Core Switch from Cisco, HP & Huawei, 135 Nos. Layer 2 distribution Switches, CISCO Pix Firewalls for Security, Central Authentication Gateway and Network Management System. Uninterrupted Internet services have been provided in SMVDU campus from 1 Gbps Internet leased line link from BSNL under NMEICT.

Application servers for various Schools have been created to

provide seamless access to network licensed packages like AutoCAD, Ansys, Prowess CMIE, NetSim etc. The backbone was changed over fully to OFC covering the complete campus including Hostels.

All the faculty as well as the students have full access to the internet and learning is never a problem here.

- 2.5.3 IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes (continuous internal assessment and end-semester assessment) have brought in considerable improvement in examination management system of the institution
 - 1. The University has been using an in-house developed software (Examsoft) for generation of results and computation of CGPA / SGPA of the students. The grade sheets, transcripts, and provisional / migration certificates are also generated through the software while the registration was earlier done using another proprietary software. This proprietary system has been replaced by e-SAMARTH package which acts as a single seamless entity for student registration, generation of admit cards and generation of grade sheets by the faculty members thus reducing any scope for anomalies and inaccuracies while cutting down drastically on the time required for preparation of grade sheets. The Examsoft package is integrated with this thus making it very convenient to compile the results in a much shorter time.
 - 2. The University has also registered for National Academic Depositary (NAD) and Academic Bank of Credits schemes and has designed software package, integrated with the Examsoft and e-SAMARTH for automating the process of compiling and uploading the academic awards of the students on the NAD portal.
 - 3. The University has adopted the mechanism for forwarding the academic documents of the studentsby electronic transmission mode to WES, IQAS, and foreign universities for verification purposes, whenever such requests are received from the concerned students.
 - 4. The University has introduced security feature based papers for printing of Semester Grade Sheets (Mark Sheets), Transcripts, Provisional & Migration certificates that are issued to the students to prevent any tampering of the certificates.

3.3 - Innovation Ecosystem

3.3.1 - Institution has created an eco-system for innovations including Incubation centre and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

University has a fully functional incubation center (SMVDU Technology Business Incubation Center) established in 2015. It has been jointly established with the Grant-in-aid from NSTEDB, DST, GOI and SMVDU.

TBIC has offered physical incubation to more than 15 startups and virtual incubation to 28 startups in the last 3 years. 22 startups have been funded under NIDHI Seed Support Program whereas 17 Prayasees have been supported under NIDHI Prayas funding scheme of DST, GOI. Startups are actively working and catering to diversified sectors like Agriculture, IT, Biotec etc. These incubated companies have generated patents and created a job pool of about 100 people.

Incubator has disbursed more than Rs. 2.35 crores to various startups and invested more than Rs. 2 crores in sophisticated equipments.

The proposal of allowing faculty members of the University to seek consultancy jobs was approved in the 16th meeting of the Executive Council held on 30th November, 2011. In order to encourage faculty members to undertake consultancies, a marginal share of 25% of the total fee was earmarked as overhead charges payable to the University.

However, of late it has been observed that many Missions, SPVs, Corporations, Government Departments, Organizations, Institutions, Societies etc. are signing MoUs and offering Institutional Consultancies to the Universities and therefore a need has been felt to revise the above overhead charges.

Subsequently, vide Notification no. SMVDU/R&D/21/6056-60 dated 24th November, 2021, the University Share/Overhead charges in case of Institutional Consultancies is enhanced to 50% of the total Consultancy Fee from the existing share of 25%, wherever,

the party seeking consultancy services signs a MoU with the University as an Institution providing the said services. However, in case a faculty member gets a consultancy assignment on his/her own merit, the Overhead Charges / University Share shall remain unchanged at 25% of the total consultancy fee.

The Central Library, SMVDU is a specialized technical library. Various sections of the Central Library are Acquisition Section, Technical Section, Circulation Section, Reference Section, Periodical Section, Digital Library, Reading Section, Photocopy Section. The Central Library collection encompasses Management, Economics, Engineering, Architecture, Sciences, Philosophy, Culture, Religion, English, Dogri and Hindi Literature.

All the students and employees of the University are eligible for membership of the library. The Library Membership is also open for external users. The library is equipped with an Integrated Library Management software package - e-Granthalya 4.0 version with all the modules for the library housekeeping operations, status of books (issued/on-shelf) and can check the account overdue against the borrower. Using e-granthalya OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue), users can search the Library Online Catalogue by Author, Title, Subject, and Keywords. One can also search or check the same on Internet through WebOPAC with the help of e-Granthalya software. The entire Library collection is Bar-coded. The Bar-coded Library cards are issued to the members in order to avail the library facilities. Reprographic facilities are also available within the Library premises. In order to get books on loan basis (ILL) reprints of journal articles on request is possible through DELNET (Developing Library Network). Library is also a member of

The University ensures optimum utilization of funds through various measures such as controlling administrative expenses, sharing common facilities among the Departments and Centres. Faculty members are encouraged to apply for projects from Government agencies to carry out their research in the campus.

Resource Mobilization Policy and Procedure

Main resource of the funds of the University is Student's fee receipts. Any increase in the fee structure is approved by the Executive Council. In addition the University is provided Annual recurring grant by the Shri Mata Vaishno Devi Shrine Board and the Higher Education department of J&K Govt. The surplus funds are invested in appropriate security Bonds/FDRs on competitive interest rate by the investment committee of the University.

The implementation of the important recommendations of the National Education Policy 2020 is one of the major action plans for session 2023-24. The university is also an important component of the UT Level Committee established for making recommendations for implementation of the provisions of the NEP 2020 across the Higher Education Institutions in J&K. The university has registered itself for Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) of UGC. It is also planned to adopt the usage of regional languages into the curriculum with at least one foreign language in all programs.

The University planned for establishing following new programs:

- 1. B.Tech. in Mathematics & Computing
- 2. Bachelor of Design
- 3. B.Tech. (Biotechnology)

The University has also planned To establish a full-fledged Skill Training Centre. To take the necessary steps to improve

NIRF 2022 ranking, ARIIA ranking, Times higher Education Impact rankings globally. To open Research Centres in various contemporary areas to strengthen research in areas of direct impact and contemporary importance.

Further, it was decided to offer Four Year UG Programs as per NEP 2020 guidelines.
